

Thank you for your interest in the 2023 International Handel Singing Competition, one of the world's leading competitions for baroque singers.

We've listened to your feedback over the past few years and for 2023, are pleased to announce a streamlined application process as well as guaranteeing feedback for your application as well as new panel of judges for each round.

Alumni of the HSC (*Handel Singing Competition*) have gone on to major success in their careers.

Here are some further details to help you with your application.

### **Introduction**

The International Handel Singing Competition is open to all singers aged between 23 - 34 on 1 February 2023 and is a showcase for historically informed performances of Handel's music.

There are four rounds in total:

### **PRELIMINARY ROUND**

All candidates must supply a good quality video recording of them performing an aria by Handel. Ideally, this will include the recit and the aria should be at least 3 minutes long (including any da capo). The performance can be accompanied by any keyboard instrument or ensemble.

### **FIRST ROUND**

The First Round is held at Craxton Studios in North London and a maximum of 90 singers are selected to be heard live by a panel of 3 judges. (Videos will be accepted however, we strongly recommend you perform live. Requirements for video submissions are exactly the same as if you were to perform live). Two arias by Handel (either sacred or secular), one with its preceding recit and one with da capo. These arias must be performed in the original key and original language. Maximum performance time is 10 minutes and you will be provided with a harpsichordist. (If submitting a video you must be accompanied by a harpsichordist).

### **SEMI FINAL**

The Semi Final is held at St George's, Hanover Square and a maximum of 12 singers are invited to perform with a harpsichordist two contrasting Handel arias up to 15 minutes. This is a live performance and open to the public as part of the London Handel Festival.

### **FINAL**

The Final is also held at St George's, Hanover Square and is a key date in the diary for the London Handel Festival's Spring Festival. A maximum of 6 singers are invited to return and perform an all-Handel programme with the London Handel Orchestra conducted by Laurence Cummings. A contrasting programme of up to 18 minutes. (No specific number of arias required).

## **ADJUDICATORS**

There will be 3 adjudicators for the First Round, four for the Semi Final and five for the Final. Past adjudicators have included Jane Glover, Iestyn Davies, Oliver Meares, Catherine Wyn Rogers, Rosemary Joshua, Lawrence Zazzo and John Mark Ainsley.

## **APPLICATION AND PRESELECTION**

Please register your details and pay via the London Handel Festival website. There is a two-stage process to applying. Firstly, you must apply via the event, register and pay. Secondly, please fill in our application form and email this to [competition@londonhandelfestival.org.uk](mailto:competition@londonhandelfestival.org.uk) along with a link to your video submission.

You will be informed of the results of the pre-selection by no later than 19 January 2023 and to all those who are not successful, we guarantee that feedback will be provided in 2023.

## **REASONS TO APPLY**

Both the Semi Final and Final are open to the public as part of the annual London Handel Festival and are well attended, coveted events. Many agents and promoters attend these performances. Past finalists of the competition include Iestyn Davies, Ruby Hughes, Lucy Crowe, Tim Mead, Sophie Junker, Anna Starushkevych, Grace Davidson, Alexander Chance and Hilary Cronin.

## **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

### **1. Is my repertoire limited to opera or are sacred arias allowed?**

You may perform both sacred or secular music by Handel in all rounds of the competition.

### **2. Do I have to sing the full da capos in all my arias?**

For the first round, at least one of the arias must be sung with da capo (you can sing da capo for both if you wish, but please ensure you do not exceed the 10 minute performance time). For the Semi Final and Final, all arias must be sung with da capo.

### **3. Is there a preferred language choice for the arias?**

At each stage, (first round, semi-final and final) you must sing at least two different languages and one of these must be in English.

### **4. Is the first round open to the public?**

No. You will only perform to the three adjudicators.

### **5. In what circumstances am I able to get a refund if I am not able to attend?**

Please inform us as soon as you know you cannot attend. We are only able to offer a refund under exceptional circumstances e.g. illness which has been supported by a doctor's note.

### **6. Can I bring my own accompanist for any of the rounds?**

No, everybody must use one of the London Handel Festival's official accompanists.

### **7. What sort of keyboard instrument is used for the accompaniment?**

The competition is for historically informed performance and a double-manual harpsichord A=415 is used for the First Round and Semi Final.

### **8. Will I get to warm up and practice with my harpsichordist for the First Round?**

Yes, you will have a 10-minute warm up and run through your arias with your harpsichordist. However, if you arrive late to your allocated time slot this may not be possible.

### **9. Can I release with my accompanist in advance?**

Yes, you will be provided with your harpsichordist's contact details to arrange rehearsals, if you wish, prior to the First Round. Please note, you will have to cover any costs relating to advance rehearsals.

### **10. What format can I use to submit my video?**

We advice uploading your videos to a private Youtube or Vimeo channel and sending us a link (with any relevant passwords). Alternatively, you can submit videos via email or, if they are too large, send via WeTransfer.

### **11. Can the video supplied in my preliminary application be used as well for the First Round?**

No. If you are submitting a video for the First Round, it must be different to your preliminary submission.

### **12. When will you let us know the results of the preliminary round?**

You will be contacted via email no later than 19 January 2023 with the results of the preliminary round.

**13. Will you provide feedback if I am unsuccessful in getting through to the First Round?**

Yes, for 2023 we guarantee feedback will be provided if you are unsuccessful and we will aim to have this sent to you within two weeks of results being published.

**14. How can I book tickets for London Handel Festival events?**

Tickets are available through our 'What's On' page.

**15. What times are the First Round, Semi-Final and Final?**

The First Round is held during the day between 10 - 5pm and you will be given a 10-minute time slot. The Semi Final starts at 6pm and the Final at 7pm.

**16. Can I repeat repertoire from one round to the next?**

You can repeat music from your preliminary video recording, if suitable, for the Semi-Final and Final only.

**17. When do I need to let you know repertoire choices for the First Round, Semi Final and Final?**

If you are successful in getting through to the First Round, Semi Final and Final, our team will be in touch to let you know when repertoire choices are required.

**18. What is the £40 application fee used for?**

The London Handel Festival is a charity dedicated to performing Handel's music and nurturing young talent. Ticket income only covers 40% of our costs, so we rely on our family of supporters for continued success. Your application fee helps us fund the competition including; venue hire, musicians costs, staff salaries and all administrative costs.
